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Whitely's murder solved

Police have confirmed that they are no longer searching for the body of the kidnapped Reverend Whitely, after investigating a crematorium following an investigation by Meldrum's Serious Crime Unit. Although the body had been largely destroyed, police were able to extract sufficient evidence to confirm that the Reverend's body had been disposed of.

The details of the Reverend's abduction and subsequent death came to light after the SCU's investigation located the criminal gang responsible for abducting Whitely from the lecture he was giving at Glasgow University. Four men in all were arrested, and are currently awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty to abduction and murder in the face of overwhelming evidence.

A statement from the Reverend's family avoided any mention of the gang, but emphasised the great public service Whitely had provided throughout his life, and praising the efforts of the police for setting their minds at rest. A commemorative service will be held this month to allow the public to show their respect for the Reverend.

One has to wonder what changed recently to prompt such a heavy handed and clumsy resolution to the problem the reverend has posed in Glasgow for the past couple of years. Also it speaks volumes about the caliber of kindred of Glasgow that in the end they resorted to sending in some thugs to kill the man two years after he becomes a problem.

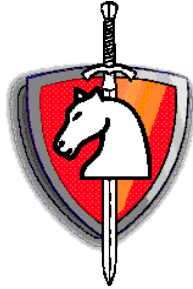
