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University plagued

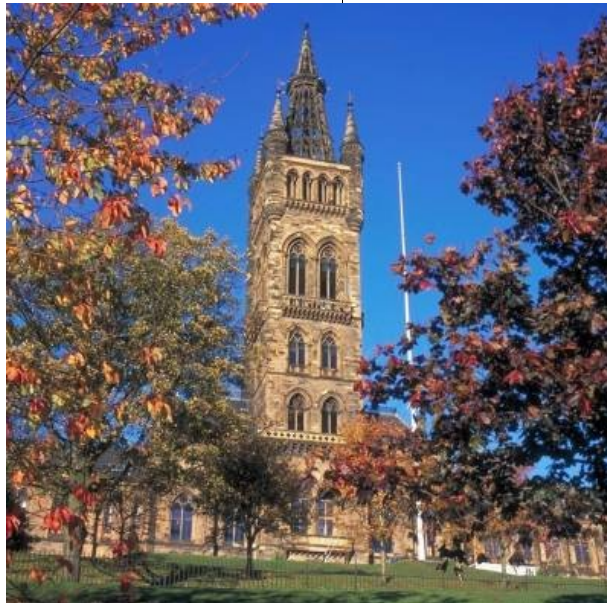

Chaos erupted at Glasgow University this month after an unexplained death in a laboratory was attributed to an outbreak of one of the infectious diseases which had been contained within the facility. Since the body was discovered around a week ago, the lab was sealed and thirteen others who had worked in the laboratory were placed into strict quarantine.

Meanwhile, the original victim was named as Chris Underwood, a PHD student who had been researching the effects of ebola and potential treatments. His body was tested for the presence of ebola, together with the other diseases and viruses which were present in the building. Coroners were shocked when every test returned positive, showing that Underwood had been infected by a combination of nine different pathogens, including ebola, HIV, smallpox and a strain of pneumonic plague.

Shortly after Underwood's death, his girlfriend, Harriet Johnstone, was taken ill and brought in to the Royal Infirmary, in what

police suspected initially to be a tragic accidental exposure to the same agents which had caused her partner's death. However, subsequent examination of Underwood's notes, and of materials found in his home have painted an alternative picture.



It appears Underwood was deeply suspicious of his partner's activities and believed her to be having an affair with a number of other men. In a bout of insane jealousy, Underwood set out to end both their lives by infecting himself with whatever agents were available in the laboratory. While his death was eventually attributed to ebola, most of the other infections he

cultivated could have proved ultimately fatal. With the cause of death taking some days to discover after Miss Johnstone was admitted to hospital, doctors are not optimistic about her chances.

In the meantime, Glasgow University has been closed completely for a week and placed

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under quarantine while the extent of the outbreak is established, and while questions are asked of the security measures which could have prevented this from occurring. Police are also trying to establish anyone who may have come into contact with Mr Underwood or Miss Johnstone before their respective hospitalisations.

Underworld in flames

Following the death this month of two prominent members of opposing Glaswegian crime syndicates, a spate of violent confrontations has erupted in the territories bordering their respective fields of influence, the north and parts of the west being controlled by the one family, the other being the east end of the city governed by the other.

Late on the 23rd of February, Sammy, a well known drug dealer whose turf was centred on Byres Road in Glasgow's West end, was assassinated in a competent, brutal attack with a bladed weapon, believed to be a sword. Sammy was killed by a single thrust which severed his carotid artery, and police are believed to be searching for leads on a small number of capable individuals known to be present in Glasgow's underworld.

Sammy's body was not discovered immediately, rather the body was dumped under a railway bridge north of Cambuslang, deep within the territory of the rival family. Sammy's body was uncovered by two joggers early the following morning, his body being identified that afternoon and the story making the headlines that evening.

Three days later, the retaliation which had been expected by many materialised as a senior enforcer for the east end family was shot in a supermarket car-park, twice in the chest, then once in the head with a 9mm pistol. The gunman escaped into a waiting van which was discovered abandoned later the same day in the north of the city.

On the 1st of March, in a public council run Library, a member of the public discovered the pistol which had been stashed among the bookshelves there. Since these stories broke, gunfire and violent attacks with knives and baseball bats have broken out between junior members of both families in Springburn and Easterhouse.

Trouble at Faslane

Faslane has had its share of disturbances in the years it has played host to the Trident submarine program and a significant portion of the UK's nuclear armament. Guards have been discovered drunk on duty or have been shot at with air rifles, while peace protestors have breached perimeter fences on numerous occasions, chaining themselves to buildings, or even the submarines

themselves and circulating pictures on the internet.

However, this month saw potentially the most significant breach of security at the base since its opening, as a high security storehouse was targeted, and components of the Trident missile systems appear to have been taken. This suggests a far greater degree of organisation and intent than peace protestors have previously displayed; the crime demonstrated the ability to flaunt severe security measures, high tech locking mechanisms and knowledge of the layout and contents of the base's internal set up.

It has been claimed that the alleged theft is an excuse to lock up protestors on the basis of anti terror legislation and to remove the ongoing nuisance they create to Faslane and the surrounding area. However, while the Navy have been quick to cooperate with police in apprehending the protestors, they have denied that anything was obtained during the break in, merely stating that the attempt poses a national security threat and the culprits must be found.

Urban Development

In a substantial investment into the ongoing program of urban development and regeneration in Glasgow's East End, 2 large blocks of tenement flats are being demolished to make way for a suite of high grade office complexes. The tenement blocks are on Dunragit Street and Dreghorn Street in the Denniston area of Glasgow. The residents of the blocks have been relocated within the local area and planning permission has been granted, subject to the developer making significant improvements to the local infrastructure.

The project was announced to press at Glasgow City Council's offices, with a number of very pleased councillors shaking hands with the developers for the benefit of the gathered media. Demolition works have now begun on this

project, which is expected to complete around February 2011.

One of the questions I get asked most often is about advertising. Is it really worth the money? It is very easy to hop on the first newspaper deal that comes your way without first determining if newspapers are best for your product or service. In conclusion, the only way to really be sure what is best for your business is to test and try in a small scale and only heavily invest in methods which you have proved work for you.

Government News

Tightening the Repossession Rules – Mortgage lenders have to inform local authorities when repossession action is started against residents in their area so that councils can step in with advice and help for those most in need, under new court rules that came into force on 1st October to provide further protection for those struggling with mortgage arrears.

Bankruptcy Procedure Reform Cancelled – Proposals for individuals to be able to submit bankruptcy applications online or through post rather than in a court has been denied. This

proposal would have made it easier for people overwhelmed by out of control debts to seek relief through bankruptcy. Research shows that it can currently take up to 3 months between first contacting the court and the making of the bankruptcy order.

HM Revenue & Customs

HMRC are seeking views from businesses on draft legislation on deliberate wrongdoing by tax agents. The draft legislation reflects the proposals in the consultation document “Working with Tax Agents: The Next Stage” published on 9 December 2009.
