In a dramatic twist to the story of Reverend Whitely, Glasgow's resident anti-vampire preacher, the Reverend was abducted by a group of armed men. The attack happened at Glasgow University at 2.30pm on the 17th of November, shortly after the Reverend had completed a guest lecture on God's place in modern academia.

The students had largely exited the building by the time of the attack, although one shocked attendee recalled: "I was shoved to one side as five or six men walked past me. A groundswell of support appears to be gathering behind a movement to oppose the Glasgow O's project, which has seen the company position advanced CCTV cameras covering a large portion of the city.

Campaigners from a range of political and social backgrounds have begun to express serious concerns over the level of surveillance in Glasgow, questioning the necessity for many of the cameras and the power this program has placed into the hands of a private, for-profit company.

The degree of support for the movement has reached such a level, that local and national governments have begun to discuss the issue, and to

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consider the potential costs should the matter reach court – as it seems destined to do. While the Scottish Government's position has been reserved for the moment, any decision it takes against the revolutionary cameras could spell the end for their spread, just as many believed they would be expanded to other cities in Scotland, and the rest of the UK.

While the protests which have taken place so far have been entirely peaceful, there does appear to be a growing resentment towards the Glasgow O, and it must be questioned how long the company can maintain its public sector contracts in the face of such opposition.

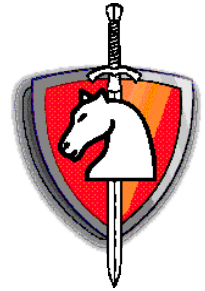
