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PAPER BURNS

The arson attacks which caused such damage in Glasgow last month have continued into September, though much of their work has been thwarted.

Attacks on both the Gallery of Modern Art and the City Council Chambers were foiled by security at the buildings, who were able to spot the attackers – youths with Molotov cock-

tails and masks. They were quickly driven off, and security even managed to grab hold of a couple of the perpetrators.

Meanwhile though, another building was not so fortunate, as the Glasgow Herald



was the subject of an assault, which resulted in significant fire damage to the internal fixtures and prevented publication of the paper for days while alternative arrangements were made.

The choice of non-Elysium locations to attack seems to suggest that there may be some purpose to these attacks beyond attempting to injure

A BURNING TIDE

What began as a story of a protest movement escalating to violence has taken a dark and tragic turn. Contrary to initial reports of no casualties, the discovery of the charred remains of a mother and child in the ruin of the well-loved King's Theatre prompted many public outpourings of grief in the media, along with considerable outrage at those responsible. Fire investigators are trying to find the relatives of the deceased, and are said to be scouring what evidence may have survived the fire, along with security footage from before the incident to trace their movements. No missing person reports matching the pair have yet been filed, a fact many feel to be significant.

Shortly after the grisly discovery, a candle-

lit vigil was organised via social media channels, with many local celebrities lending their considerable online presences to encouraging their fans to attend. The successful remembrance ceremony blocked traffic on Bath Street for hours, and was in danger of disrupting commerce in nearby areas. Local actress Samantha Merton, best known for her critically-acclaimed Maria in London's West End production of The Sound of Music, made a special appearance to lead the mourners in song.

Ms Merton also appeared on STV News to discuss the arson and to condemn the protestors who had destroyed the landmark. Her tale of how watching pantomimes at the theatre inspired her rise to

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fame were well received by her sympathetic hosts. Similarly upset stars made their concern known via interviews on television and in the newspapers of the fate of the People's Palace and the Scotland Street Museum. Indeed, a curator achieved brief fame for his tearful plea to the protestors to end their attacks on cherished public property. "Can't you people understand that burning our heritage hurts us all", he was quoted as saying.

Unfortunately, the police appear to be no closer to identifying those responsible for the attacks, though increased security is evident on other public buildings in the city. Whether these are funded by the police service or by private companies funded by the council was unclear – either way, the public purse is no doubt being dipped for funds. A police spokesman called for public calm and for anyone with information per-

taining to the identities of the arsonists to call a special hotline.

Public opinion appears to be turning against the protestors for now, with angry rhetoric against their action being widely spread. Meanwhile, those public figures who have formed part of the protest movement have sought to distance their numerous peaceful protests from an associated extremist element. Matt Andrews, a local politician who has been a staunch supporter of the protest movement, was quoted as saying "Just like the riots in London, any large movement of public conscience tends to attract those with a destructive mentality, who have no concept of the struggle for positive change." The protests are gradually losing support despite this disavowal of the attacks, but it remains unclear whether this will halt the hard-core element of the movement.
